(GERRISH ALTERNATIVE POLICING STRATEGIES)</u> Several years ago, in an effort to continue to improve the delivery of police services to our citizens and in the form of the true "Community Policing" philosophy, Gerrish Township was divided into three areas. Each of the areas are of different size, but the population of each is very close. The reason for this division was to give our officers an area that each was responsible to. That is to say, they are the ones who will assist in solving non-emergency problems in each area. Two officers have been assigned to each area. One of those two officers should be on duty most of the time to assist citizens with neighborhood problems and concerns.


The GAP officers will assist citizens in starting up Neighborhood Watch groups and keep them updated and informed about situations and incidents to be aware of in their areas. GAP officers will be available to assist citizens in a variety of quality of life issues such as

Junk & Garbage complaints, barking dogs, neighbor or neighborhood problems, suspicious persons or situations and any other area where the citizen may be experiencing difficulty and would like some help in either solving a problem or assistance in being pointed in the right direction. It is important for citizens to remember that the problem DOES NOT have to be of a criminal

nature for one of the GAP officers to lend a helping hand. It is easy...if you would like to speak with a GAP officer, just call or email. Leave a message and they will get back with you A.S.A.P.

- Color & Kind of Clothing & Footwear
- Voice Accent, Speech Impediment, Tone

GOOD SECURITY HABITS



HOUSE NUMBERS: HOUSE NUMBERS SHOULD BE VISIBLE DAY AND NIGHT FROM THE STREET. IN RURAL AREAS NAME AND HOUSE NUMBER SHOULD BE DISPLAYED ON THE MAIL BOX. THIS IS IMPORTANT FOR POLICE AND FIRE/EMS WHEN RESPONDING TO A COMPLAINT OR A CALL. (SEE HOUSE NUMBER ORDINANCE)

SHRUBBERY: IS THERE A CLEAR VIEW OF THE DOOR? OR IS IT HIDDEN BY SHRUBS? IF SO, THIN THE GROWTH SO THAT WOULD-BE BURGLARS ARE DENIED THE OPPORTUNITY TO WORK UNDETECTED. RE-KEY LOCKS: THIS SHOULD BE DONE WHEN MOVING INTO AN APARTMENT OR WITH SECOND OWNERSHIP OF HOMES.

USE THE LOCKS: AN UNLOCKED LOCK IS NOT A LOCK!! HABITUALLY LOCKING YOUR HOME, CLOSING AND LOCKING GARAGE DOORS WHEN AWAY OR AT NIGHT IS SOMETHING TO BE EMPHASIZED WITH ALL RESIDENTS.

HIDING KEYS: AN EXTRA KEY HIDDEN IN A "SECRET" LOCATION SHOULD ALWAYS BE AVOIDED. A BURGLAR KNOWS ALL THE "HIDING SPOTS" AND WILL SEARCH OUT THESE AREAS FOR SPARE KEYS.

DETER AND DENY THE OPPORTUNITY OF BECOMING A THEFT VICTIM...REMEMBER CRIME PREVENTION BEGINS AT HOME.

KEEP BURGLARS AWAY

CLEAN UP:

CLEAN UP YOUR YARD AREA. NEVER LEAVE SMALL PORTABLE ITEMS (LAWN CHAIRS, BIKES, ETC.) LAYING AROUND WHERE THEY MAY BE EASILY STOLEN. KEEP THEM IN THE GARAGE OR SHED WITH THE DOOR CLOSED AND LOCKED.



ROUTINE: ALTER YOU DAILY ROUTINE OCCASIONALLY, TO CONFUSE ANY WOULD-BE BURGLAR WHO MAY BE WATCHING YOUR HOUSE.

LIGHTING: TURNING INTERIOR LIGHTS ON WITH A TIMER IS INEXPENSIVE AND IS RECOMMENDED. A RADIO OR TV LEFT PLAYING DURING THE DAY WHEN AWAY WILL ALSO CONFUSE AND DETER A BURGLAR. EXTERNAL LIGHTING IS ALSO IMPORTANT, BUT EXCLUSIVE USE OF OUTSIDE LIGHTING WHEN THE HOME IS UNOCCUPIED MAY ACTUALLY TIP OFF THE BURGLAR. REPORT ANY BROKEN STREET LIGHTS IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD. ADMITTING STRANGERS: ALWAYS BE CAREFUL ABOUT ADMITTING STRANGERS. IDENTIFICATION OF SALESPERSONS, PUBLIC UTILITIES PERSONNEL, REPAIR PERSONS AND STRANDED STRANGERS SHOULD ALWAYS BE REQUIRED BEFORE OPENING THE DOOR. CHECK TO SEE WHO THE PERSON IS BEFORE OPENING DOOR BY LOOKING THROUGH A WINDOW OR DOOR VIEWER. NEVER PARTIALLY OPEN THE DOOR, EVEN IF A DOOR CHAIN IS ATTACHED.


HELP CATCH A CRIMINAL!

No criminal wants to be CAUGHT. But if you SEE or HEAR someone breaking the law, try to REMEMBER what they look like and quickly REPORT them to the police.


The most valuable aid you can give a police officer about a crime is help in the identification of suspects. This and the facts you observe about the crime itself are the two main points on which an officer bases their investigation. These two items can, in many cases, be far more important than the findings made through scientific investigation at the scene such as fingerprints, foot casts, etc. Many times such evidence is non-existent.

DESCRIBING A VEHICLE

When describing a vehicle, attempt to supply as much information as possible that would allow the officers to distinguish this vehicle from many others.

Start description from the top of list below:

- 1) LICENSE NUMBERS-most important.
- 2) Color(s)-two-tone, three-tone, etc.
- 3) Body Style-2-door, 4-door, pick up, etc.
- 4) Make-Chevrolet, Ford, Oldsmobile, Plymouth.
- 5) Year-(if not known) new or old.
- 6) Any outstanding features-damage, rust, clean, dirty, CB antenna, etc.

A VACANT HOUSE IS AN APPEALING TARGET TO A BURGLAR. WHETHER YOU ARE OUT FOR THE DAY, WEEKEND OR FOR AN EXTENDED VACATION YOU CAN ALLEVIATE WORRIES IF YOU TAKE A FEW SIMPLE STEPS TO REDUCE THE POSSIBILITY THAT YOUR HOME WILL BE BURGLARIZED OR VANDALIZED WHILE YOU ARE GONE.

At least one day before you leave...

1. Arrange with a neighbor to pick up and hold your mail and newspapers so that they don't pile up or notify you post office to hold your deliveries.

2. Make arrangements to have grass cut and watered while you are gone or to have your snow removed.

3. If you have valuables in the house, take them to your bank for storage in a safety deposit box. Deposit any extra cash in your bank account.

 Complete a "House Check" form at the police department or on the P.D. website including your departure and return dates and give a telephone number of a neighbor or relative to notify in case of emergency.

5. Make sure any broken windows, door locks or window locks are repaired.

 Arrange with a neighbor or relative to watch your house and give them a key. Let them know where and how you can be reached in an emergency. Write their telephone numbers down so you can check with them during your trip. Give them your car description and license number.
Move all ladders, tools, lawn implements, garbage cans and yard furniture to your garage, basement or

storage shed.

On the day you leave...

 Unplug all electrical appliances such as radios, television sets, irons, washers, fans and computers to prevent possible damage from electrical storms.
Make sure all gas appliances are in good working order and that pilot lights are working.

- 2. Set your thermostat to a reasonable temperature.
- 3. Close your fireplace flue to prevent birds/animals from entering.

4. Turn down the volume control on telephone answering machine so that it cannot be heard outside.

5. Close and lock all windows and doors. Make sure sliding doors are braced securely and that screens and

storm windows are locked or fastened.

6. Leave window coverings open in normal daytime position so that neighbors and police can see inside.

- 7. Set electrical timers to turn some lights on and off during the evening hours.
- 8. If you are leaving a vehicle in your driveway, make sure it is locked.

9. Lock your garage doors.

 Make sure the last person out locks the door.
Take a walk around the house. Check all the doors and windows.


