Memorial Day honors those who lost their lives while defending their country in American Wars and also remembers those Veterans who have died during active-duty during peacetime while serving in Overseas Contingency Operations.

America's first Memorial Day observance was on May 5, 1968, it began as "Decoration Day" in 1868. In 1971, it was moved to the last Monday in May. The number of Veteran fatalities during major wars were:

WWI 116,516 WWII 405,399 Korean War 36,516 Vietnam War 58,209 War on Terror 7,075

Trends in active-duty military deaths from 2006 - 2021 totaled 19,378 with the highest number in 2007 and the lowest number in 2016. These deaths occur in a range of categories including accidents, self-inflicted, illness/injury, killed in action, homicide, terrorism and while captured.

Approximately 260,000 graves at the Arlington National Cemetery are decorated with American flags for Memorial Day each year and over 135,000 people visit Arlington National Cemetery over the Memorial Day weekend each year.

STOP THE BLEED DAY - MAY 25, 2023

Stop the Bleed is a national Stop the Bleed is intended to cultivate bystanders to become trained, bleeding emergency before



awareness campaign and call-to-action. grassroots efforts that encourage equipped, and empowered to help in a professional help arrives.

The ABC steps are:

A - Alert Emergency Personnel - Call 9-1-1.

B - Bleeding - Locate the bleeding injury.

C - Compress - Apply pressure and compression to stop the bleeding.

Stop the Bleed was started in 2015, after the Sandy Hook Elementary School tragedy. "Hemorrhage control" or bleeding control was one of the most important factors in saving lives that day. Whether at home or out in public, knowing how to control bleeding can make a life-or-death difference when the need arises.
